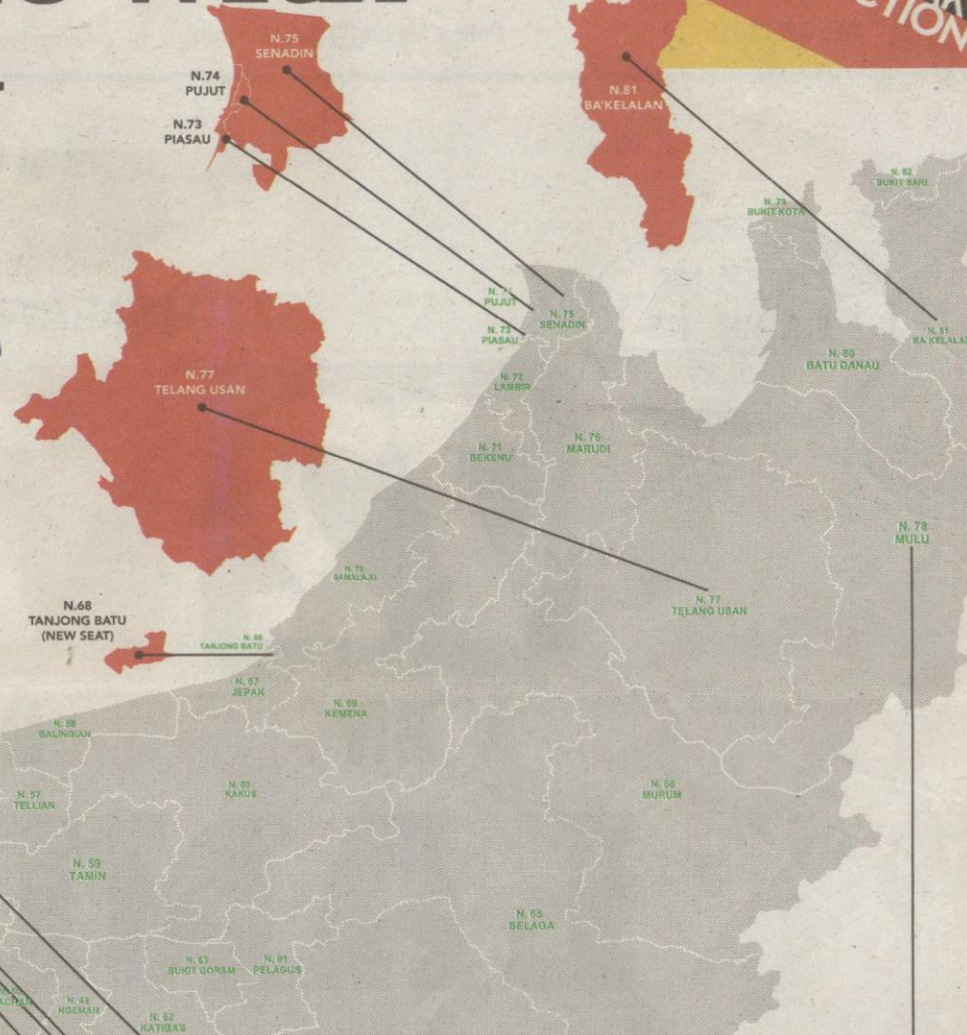

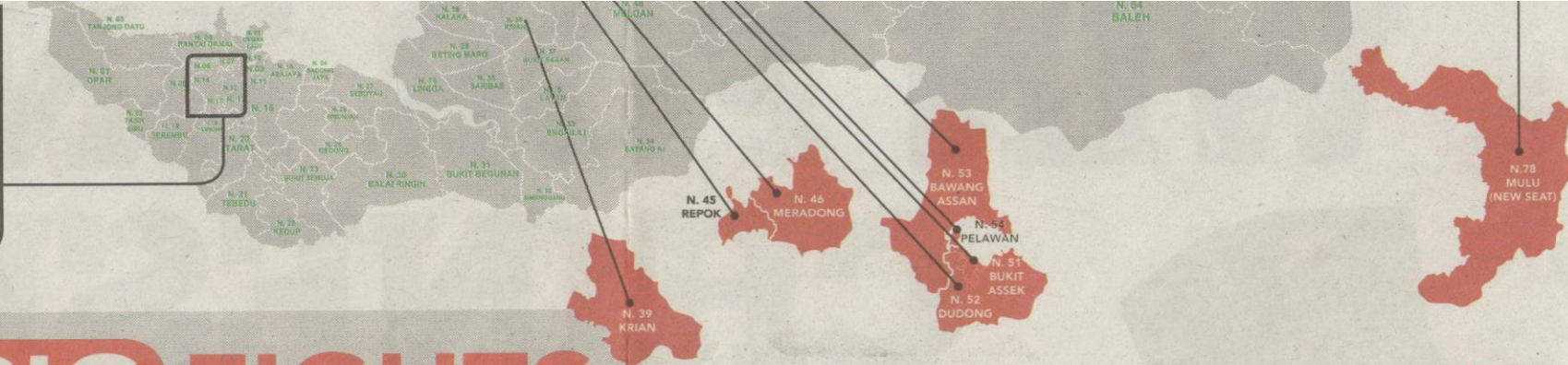

BN reclaims Chinese-majority seats

KUCHING — Barisan Nasional pulled off a stunning victory when it won 72 out of 82 seats last night, with Sarawak United People's Party (SUPP) retaking five Chinese-majority seats.

Although 11 new seats were contested this year, the coalition succeeded in not only preventing an advance by the Opposition but had also beaten DAP in several seats.

SUPP defeated DAP in Piasau, Meradong, Repok, Dudong and Batu Kawah, winning seven of 13 seats contested.

SUPP president Dr Sim Kui Hian was perhaps the biggest winner, with everything to lose in his second attempt in a state election.

He garnered 6,414 votes to defeat the incumbent, Christina Chiew, with a majority of 2,085 votes. Former SUPP member, Liu Thean Leong, who contested as an independent candidate, lost his deposit.

In a message to the press soon after he



won the seat, Dr Sim said: "Victories like these are won on the back of many months of hard work."

Paying tribute to Sarawak BN chairman Tan Sri Adenan Satem, the cardiologist said: "Today is the first day of Sarawak's five golden years under team Adenan."

He thanked a long list of people and assured his constituents he would immediately look into solving problems affecting them.

SUPP has been on a steady decline since the 2006 election due to a protracted

leadership crisis. In 2011, it suffered its biggest defeat after it was almost wiped out in Chinese-majority seats in the main urban centres. Contesting in 19 seats, the party scraped through with only six victories.

DAP, SUPP's nemesis, suffered the most significant defeat in the polls. Contesting in 31 seats, it retained seven of 12 seats won in 2011 but failed to find a foothold in the rural areas, where more than half of the seats it contested were located.

State DAP chairman Chong Chieng Jen was returned for a third term as Kota



Sentosa assemblyman but had his majority reduced by SUPP's Wilfred Yap from 4,824 in the 2011 polls to 2,810.

The party saw similar declines in other seats.

DAP's so-called Pakatan Harapan partner, PKR, did not fare any better. It only managed to hold on to the three seats it won previously — Batu Lintang, Krian and Ba'kelalan — despite contesting 40 seats.

Its state chief Baru Bian pulled through with a slim majority of 538 votes in the rematch with BN's Willie Liau, who is also his nephew. In the last election, Baru won with a majority of 473 votes.

None of the other opposition parties managed to make a dent in the polls.
